From the early days, in which Stein was more concerned with foraging food for her dogs than with the fate of democracy, to the coming of the Americans, which gave her the thrill of a lifetime, Stein depicts the

heroic exploits of the French Resistance fighters and the excitement of the battle for liberation with all of her signature literary panache.
