Protecting Human Rights Todd Landman 2005-10-04 Ours has been called a global "age of rights," an era in which respect for human rights is considered the highest aspiration of the international democratic community. Since the United Nation’s 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a wide variety of protections—civil, political, economic, social, and cultural—have been given legal validation as countries ratify treaties, participate in intergovernmental organizations, and establish human rights tribunals and truth and reconciliation commissions. The publication date of this book is 10 January 2022, which is the date marking 63 years since Christof’s birth.
