This town never was infected by that kind of goodness." Here, too, is Meryl Streep, America's premier actress, who began her career in *Julia* in 1977, and thirty odd years later, at sixty, was starring in *The Iron Lady*, defying all the rules about "term limits" and a filmmaking climate tyrannized by the male adolescent demographic . . . Streep on making her first picture, and how Jane Fonda took her under her wing ("That little line on the floor," Fonda warned Streep, "don't look at it, that's where your toes are supposed to be. And that's how you'll be in the movie. If they're not there, you won't be in the movie").
