Working-Class Network Society Jack Linchuan Qiu 2009-01-30 An examination of how the availability of low-end information and communication technology has provided a basis for the emergence of a working-class network society in China. Basing his analysis on his more than five years of empirical research conducted in twenty cities, Qiu examines technology and class, networked connectivity and public policy, in the context of massive urban reforms that affect the new working class disproportionately. The transformation of Chinese society, writes Qiu, is emblematic of the new technosocial reality emerging in much of the Global South. *The Prince and Letters* Vittorio Alfieri 1972 Alfieri's second treatise, *The Prince and Letters*, is as timely today as when first published in 1788. Herman Melville, Arthur C. Clarke and Peter Benchley get better ratings. Of all the sighted monsters, only the giant squid (*Architeuthis*) retains its mythological and cryptozoological status, for its very existence is shrouded in mystery. Sharks have had a bad reputation throughout history, but until *Jaws* (1974) they did not figure prominently in literature. At the end of this engaging book, Ellis confesses to skepticism: "monsters, if they exist, have more to fear from us than we do from them."

The Mannequin Man Luca Di Fulvio 2005 Inspector Giacomo Amaldi is confronted with a series of murders whose victims are mutilated, the only common element being the use of taxidermist thread to stitch up the wounds.
