Dr. Steven's book invites us to celebrate this truth, even as it tells a compelling story of a doctor's experience on the front lines of care; offers a road map for bringing humanity back into traditional medical practice; and gives patients, families, and caregivers a blueprint for living each day with hope.

**Fan-tastic** Penny Milks 2010-06-22 In this poignant memoir, Penny Milks reveals the intimate details of her life-long partnership with Steve Milks. From their modest beginnings, she chronicles their love affair, the ups and downs of marriage and the meteoric rise of their business. Their love grew with the business they created, and Steve's ability to Think Big-along with Penny's innate business sense-turned out to be the perfect match to build an empire. Within twenty years, the pair went from living on a dollar a day to sales that exceeded two million fans. Their products eventually became a standard feature on RVs manufactured around the world. Steve loved to spread the wealth: they employed friends and family members who wanted to join the company, and gave away cash, cars, furniture and land. **Killing Esther** Susan Shepherd 2014-12-09 "I think there's something wrong with me," my sister says. She has lost the roundness in her face that had plagued her so after our trip to Sweden last summer, and she hardly takes up the little space between the end of my chest of drawers and her side of the double closet. She seems disturbed, and in need of my sympathy, though I have only two ugly dresses hanging on my side of that closet, both hand-me-downs, while on her side is an endless row of pretty little skirts, cashmere turtlenecks, and button down blouses my mother bought her at Plain & Fancy so she'd fit in with the in-crowd kids at school. Esther was 16 when she began her descent into the madness of selfstarvation, but her self-destruction didn't begin there. Our parents had laid the groundwork for psychosis with years of histrionics and melodrama long before Esther considered her first calorie. Killing Esther is the tragicomic tale of a toxic childhood. It is a bold memoir that is sometimes maddening, sometimes amusing, and will be with the reader a long time after the last page is turned.

**Eugene O'Neill** Robert M. The Cricket War, now published with a new introduction and afterword, is the definitive account of the split that changed the game on the field and on the screen. In helmets, under lights, with white balls and in coloured clothes, the outlaw armies of Ian Chappell, Tony Greig and Clive Lloyd fought a daily battle of survival. In boardrooms and courtrooms, Packer and cricket's rulers fought a bitter war of nerves. A compelling account of top-class sporting life, The Cricket War also gives a unique insight into the motives and methods of the tycoon who became Australia's richest man.

**Beautiful Boy** David Sheff 2008 Sheff's story tells of his teenage son's addiction to meth, in this real-time chronicle of the shocking descent into substance abuse and the family's gradual emergence into hope.

**Far Out** Mark Liechty 2017-02-21 Far Out charts the history of Western countercultural longing for Nepal that made the country, and Kathmandu in particular, a premier tourist destination in the twentieth century. Anthropologist and historian Mark Liechty describes three distinct phases: the immediate post-war era when the country provided a Raj-like throwback experience for rich foreigners (mainly Americans), Nepal's emergence as the most exotic outpost of hippie counterculture in the 1960s and early '70s, and, finally, the Nepali state's rebranding of itself as an adventure destination from the 1970s on. Liechty is attuned to how the dynamics of mid-twentieth century globalization--the Cold War and shifting international relations, modernization and development ideologies, the rise of consumerist middle classes, increased mobility and the birth of mass tourism, and emerging global youth countercultures--drew Nepal into the web of geopolitical, economic, and sociocultural transformations that shaped the modern world. But Liechty doesn't want to tell the story of tourism as something that "just happened" to Nepalis. He shows how Western projections of Nepal as an isolated place inspired creative Nepali enterprises and paradoxically gave locals the opportunity to participate in the highly coveted global economy. The result is a readable cultural history of a place that has been in many ways defined by a (sometimes bizarre) cultural encounter. The author's lifelong interest in Nepal and his almost twenty-five years of research make his account both sophisticated and empathic--but not without a touch of humor.

**The Saliva Milkshake** Howard Brenton 1980
